

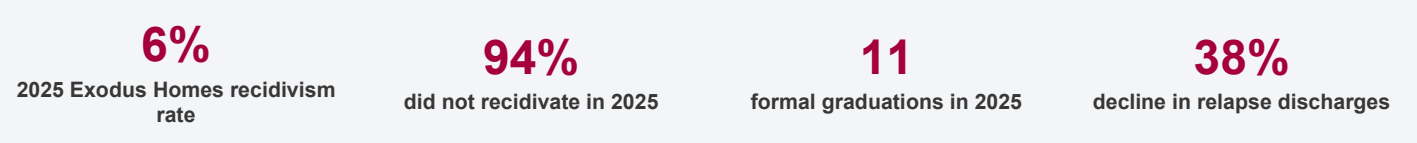
EXODUS HOMES | 2024-2025 IMPACT AT A GLANCE

Stability. Dignity. Hope. A pathway to recovery and a second chance.

WHY EXODUS HOMES IS NEEDED

People entering recovery and reentry often face homelessness, addiction, trauma, unemployment, disrupted family relationships, and limited support systems at the same time. Exodus Homes provides safe housing, recovery support, peer relationships, accountability, case management, employment preparation, spiritual encouragement, and a community that believes change is possible. This combination helps residents move from crisis toward stability, independence, and meaningful reintegration.

WHAT THE DATA SHOWS

- Lower recidivism:** Exodus Homes improved from 9% in 2024 to 6% in 2025, while the supplied statewide rate increased from 44% to 47%. In 2025, 94% of Exodus Homes participants did not recidivate.
- Stronger recovery outcomes:** Formal graduations increased from 9 to 11, while relapse-related discharges declined from 21 to 13. These changes show more program completion and greater recovery stability.
- A critical bridge after detox:** About 7 out of every 10 referrals came from detox facilities. Detox addresses immediate physical stabilization, but safe housing and continued support are essential for long-term recovery.
- Recovery readiness:** Recovery is a lifelong journey and may take more than one attempt. Not everyone is immediately ready for structure and accountability, yet most participants do not return to prison.

A COST-EFFECTIVE COMMUNITY INVESTMENT

\$114.92 less per person per day than the supplied average cost of North Carolina incarceration. Annualized, this represents a mathematical difference of approximately \$41,945.80 per person. Although the settings serve different purposes, the comparison shows the financial value of supporting eligible people in a structured community environment.

THE CASE FOR CONTINUED SUPPORT

Exodus Homes meets people at a critical point when the absence of housing, accountability, and support can lead to relapse, homelessness, unemployment, or renewed incarceration. The report’s recidivism, discharge, referral, length-of-stay, and cost findings demonstrate that Exodus Homes is both necessary and effective. Continued investment supports safer communities, stronger families, responsible use of resources, and the opportunity for vulnerable people to rebuild their lives with dignity, stability, and purpose.

THE BOTTOM LINE

Exodus Homes is more than a place to live. It is a recovery and reentry community that helps people address the conditions that can lead to relapse and incarceration. Supporting Exodus Homes means supporting second chances that produce measurable benefits for individuals, families, and the wider community.
